## GREETING HEIDEMARIE WIECZOREK-ZEUL



Dear Reader,

Thinking about how we can bring more sustainability into the world is always thinking about more justice and solidarity. Everyone can benefit from this. In this respect, I am delighted to have the opportunity to reflect on sustainability with you for the second time at this point. The first opportunity was in August 2020 at the ADRA Sustainability Conference in Darmstadt.

For me, it has always been about making sustainable politics. In this context, sustainable policy does not only refer to development cooperation, but to all policy areas: Trade policy (keyword supply chain law), environmental policy (keyword climate change) and many more. The United Nations' 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) also take this into account. As a reminder, in 2015, all world leaders passed a resolution at the UN General Assembly committing all world governments to implement the Sustainable Development Goals by 2030. This decision is nothing less than a turning point in time. With the SDGs, the whole world commits to making globalization equitable, ecological, and social, fighting poverty, pandemics (HIV/AIDS, Ebola), combating climate change and inequality.

Whether the resolutions of that time can stand up to the Corona pandemic will be seen by our response. The fact is, with the pandemic, extreme poverty is back. In lethal combination with climate change, the proportion of people living in extreme poverty is rising again, whereas it has been gradually declining over the past 20 years.

According to the International Monetary Fund (IMF), an additional 95 million people fell into extreme poverty in 2020. Hunger and child labor are also on the rise again. In any case, developing countries cannot fight the economic consequences of the pandemic with subsidies or government investment programs. Most countries were already over-indebted before the Corona crisis. It is in the interest of humanity, but also a sustainable approach, not to let developing countries crash economically. That's why we need to relieve the poorest countries of their crushing debts on the one hand, while helping them to help themselves on the other. Above all, it is important that these countries finally have full access to the vaccines against the Corona pandemic and to develop their own health systems.

We must use every opportunity and only as a global community can we break the vicious cycle of poverty and inequality. My great hope is that we will not be thrown back to pre-2015 levels after the Corona pandemic. This will take an awake, enlightened civil society and organizations like ADRA that are dedicated to serving people. Dear team at ADRA, please keep up the good work!

# Everyone has a right to clean water



For us, it is an everyday occurrence that clean water comes out of the tap in sufficient quantities. But one in two people do not have this luxury, because 50 percent of the world's population has no reliable water supply at least some of the time. One in ten has no assured access to clean drinking water.

## Saving the water supply for an entire region

Pronounced periods of drought in the Kitui region of eastern Kenya left soils infertile as groundwater levels dropped. As a result, crops were lost, and people were left to starve. Many families were dependent on food aid. In the poorest villages in the region, 3,000 small farmers worked with ADRA to plan and build irrigation systems and dams.

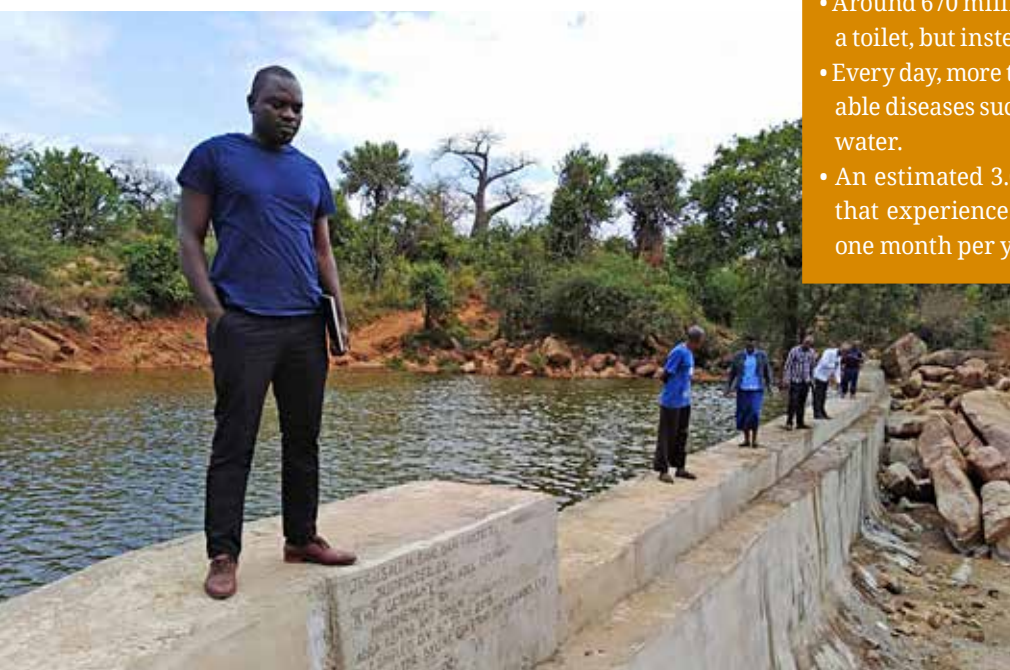
## It was worth it for all participants!

Supported by ADRA, the smallholders developed water-saving cultivation methods. Thanks to modern water management, water is available almost the entire year. „The harvests are now enough to feed the whole family and sell part of it. We can invest the extra money in our farm and pay school fees for our children,“ says David Kyalo, a farmer in the project. The whole region is doing better thanks to the improved water supply.

- A nighttime curfew was in effect across the country.
- Public gatherings and personal meetings were banned in large parts of the country.
- In five of seven provinces, there was a ban on entering and leaving the country.



- Around 670 million people do not have access to a toilet, but instead relieve themselves in the open.
- Every day, more than 800 children die from preventable diseases such as diarrhea due to contaminated water.
- An estimated 3.6 billion people now live in areas that experience extreme water deficit for at least one month per year.

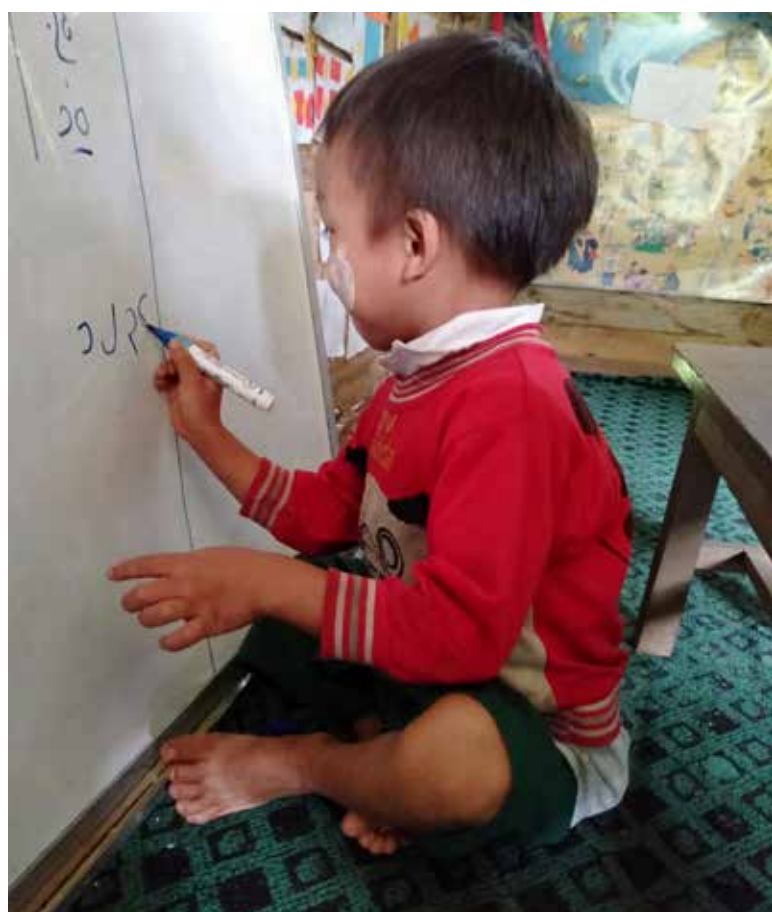
# A better education for a better future



For a long time, it was uncertain whether the national collection could be accomplished during Corona. It is only thanks to the collectors that it took place under the difficult conditions.

The state collection is a nationwide door-to-door collection that volunteers conduct in their neighborhoods. Each year, it supports a charitable project of ADRA. In 2020, 59 volunteers from 29 churches successfully collected 37,130 euros, with consideration for the contact restrictions. The donations from this collection benefited an educational project in Myanmar. Students and teachers in ten states are delighted with the support.

A good school lives from its students and its teachers. Civil war has been raging in Myanmar for decades. In the conflict areas, few children have the opportunity to attend school. And when they do go to school, there are not enough teachers for all of them. Over a project period of five years, new teachers will be trained, and the children will receive school materials. In total, 400,000 people in 5,000 schools will be supported. This effort will improve the lives of many people. More children will soon be able to attend school and learn how to better shape their lives. Many thanks to the collectors who have helped us to get a little closer to this goal!

- Since independence in 1948, armed conflicts have continued in various parts of the country.
- The country generally has a high level of political instability.



- Schools in Myanmar were temporarily closed.
- Classes were offered online in lockdown but just a few families had Internet access in their homes.

# Learning together is fun

In Serbia, the Roma live on the margins of society. They are being discriminated and are among the poorest of the poor in the country. Most of them cannot find regular work and survive as day laborers. Their children rarely attend school.

In the cities of Belgrade and Novi Sad, ADRA is working alongside Roma families to help them integrate into Serbian society. Children can attend an elementary school. In Belgrade, they receive tutoring at a community center and can play with other children in recreational activities. Adults learn new skills in training courses, which they can demonstrate on the labor market. For the Roma population, a good education means a way out of poverty and more participation in society. With the support of our donors, poor families receive food packages. Because you can only learn well with a full stomach!

- Schools and the community center in Belgrade had to close due to the pandemic.
- Lessons and trainings were offered digitally during this time.



According to official estimates, there are about 400,000 Roma living in Serbia.

# Shaping the future together



On August 4, 2020, a huge explosion in the port of Beirut devastated the entire city on a large scale and shook its inhabitants.

Large parts of the port as well as the surrounding urban areas were destroyed. 190 people lost their lives, 5,000 others were injured and 300,000 people were left without shelter. To ensure the survival of residents after the disaster, ADRA distributed drinking water and food.

We want to enable those who lost their homes in the explosion to return home. Together with our network partners, we are supporting people to rebuild their homes in a six-month project. By the end of February 2021, 470 households in particular need (around 2,800 people) received cash in the amount of \$500 to do initial repairs. The beneficiaries will thus be able to carry out the repair work on their homes themselves, according to their own ideas. Elderly people in particular received assistance in rebuilding their homes. In recent years, a severe economic crisis plunged large sections of the population into poverty. The economic situation worsened further after the explosion in Beirut. The introduction of

two lockdowns in the summer and fall of 2020, to combat the Corona pandemic, hit the economy and the people even harder. Many people are tired and desperate. During this difficult time, people want only one thing: to protect the lives of their families and friends. In this task they are supported by ADRA.



- Population in Beirut: 2,332,000
- The country has been in a deep political and economic crisis for years. People need our help to make it possible to return to their homes.



- The explosion in the port additionally increased the pressure on the health facilities in the capital. Important infrastructures such as hospitals are only partially functional.
- The payment of aid funds has been delayed due to the strict lockdowns.

# A safe home for the people of Assam



In June 2020, the Indian state of Assam was hit by severe flooding.

The Brahmaputra River burst its banks. Thousands of localities were under water. The floods destroyed the belongings of the poorest inhabitants of this region in minutes. With the support of the European Union and our donors, ADRA stood by the people in this difficult time. As part of a joint project with OXFAM, ADRA took care of nearly 100,000 victims. Those affected received both a financial grant for food and building materials to repair their homes. Those who lost their homes found shelter and protection in emergency shelters. Access to drinking water was improved by cleaning, disinfecting, and chlorinating 70 manual pumps and wells. Households received hygiene kits to prevent the spread of COVID-19 pandemic and other diseases.



- Floods occur regularly in Assam during the monsoon season. This year, however, the first floods occurred unusually early.
- More than 7 million people were directly affected by the disaster and 133 people lost their lives.



- To prevent the rapid spread of the COVID pandemic, the project focused on providing safe drinking water.
- A lockdown was implemented in the region in the summer of 2020, which slowed the distribution of relief supplies.

# Survival in war



Since 2012, ADRA Germany has been implementing health projects in Yemen together with the local ADRA office. ADRA maintains twelve health facilities in order to be where help is needed.

In the poorest regions of Al-Hudaydah, Hajjah and Saada, ADRA provides free emergency medical assistance to approximately 450,000 people with the support of the German Foreign Office and our donors. Hospitals and mobile clinics are supported financially and logistically to save the lives of many people. Several hospitals have been expanded in the last two years and received better equipment. Now people can get their necessary medicines in specially equipped pharmacies. Thanks to the installation of sanitary facilities, water treatment and water purification plants, hygiene in the hospitals is improving. People are better protected against cholera epidemics or the COVID-19 pandemic. Thanks to our mobile teams, first aid and medicines can be provided in distant areas. In addition professionals have been trained to increase the performance and scope of medical relief efforts. We listen to people and their stories and offer them psychosocial support.

From 2021, emergency medical aid will be expanded in the area. As part of another project, the Yemeni healthcare system will be stabilized in the long term and its capacities expanded. Among other things, care for pregnant women and natal medicine will be improved in order to sustainably reduce maternal

and infant mortality. This project is funded by the Bundesministerium für wirtschaftliche Zusammenarbeit und Entwicklung (German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development).

Emergency medical aid is being provided in the midst of the war. We cannot end the war in Yemen, but together we can save lives! Together with you, dear donor, we can create access to medical care for more people.



- Since the war began, one in three residents has suffered from malnutrition and hunger.
- According to the United Nations, more than 24 million people – about 80% of the population – need humanitarian aid.



- Hygiene concepts have been developed to protect medical staff and patients.
- In the waiting areas of healthcare facilities, visitors received Training on the new Covid 19 hygiene regulations.

# Everyone deserves a chance



Malnutrition, lack of schooling and poor health - poverty has many consequences. Worldwide, more than 700 million people live in extreme poverty, meaning they have less than 1.90 US dollars/1.59 euros per day.

Work creates income and gives people the chance to lift themselves out of poverty. For this reason, ADRA helps with market-oriented and customized concepts in the project countries. It is important that the needs of the people are not forgotten. The project design therefore considers demographic as well as cultural needs, reveals potential and awakens the motivation that lies within people.

### **Ethiopia: Investing in a sustainable future**

In May 2019, ADRA partnered with the Ministries of Energy and Education to develop the national vocational training program for solar technicians. Since then, 2,200 young adults in Ethiopia have been trained in solar energy, including 600 women. Through their training, they can help supply households with solar energy. In addition to technical training, participants are supported in finding jobs or starting businesses. This is a benefit for the young people, who earn money with clean energy. At the same time, they help ensure

that electricity is available in remote areas. Initially, the training curricula were tested in two regions. After good results and success of the training, the responsible ministries decided in 2020 to adopt the curricula for the entire country. Together with the Ministries of Energy and Education and the German Solar Energy Society, ADRA has given young people a perspective for the future. Clean and sustainable.

### **Peru: Switch to organic products**

ADRA is also active in South America. The district of Caminaca supported by ADRA has a poverty rate of 85.8 percent, and more than half of the population lives in extreme poverty. ADRA is helping 400 families increase their quinoa harvest. As a result, families have more food available and more quinoa to sell. To make the products even more attractive, the farmers produce according to organic and Fairtrade standards. In 2020, the quinoa products were certified and are now officially ORGANIC or FAIRTRADE. With

In both Ethiopia and Peru, we are enabling people affected by poverty to lift themselves out of poverty in a long-term, sustainable way. By building capacity, providing expertise, and providing work materials, they are able to improve their lives through independent work. The goal is for people to better realize their opportunities and potential.



- 700 million people suffer from extreme poverty.
- In Ethiopia, one in four people lives below the poverty line; in Peru, the national average is 3.4 percent.
- Nearly 260 million children do not go to school. Instead, they help out around the house or have to work.
- Poverty is one of the most frequent causes of disease.



- Ethiopia: People suffered from the lockdown, children could not go to school, farmers could not sell food. The health system was not prepared.
- Peru was hit very hard by COVID-19 and was classified as a high incidence area. The Corona mortality was the highest in the world.

## So that no child must go to bed hungry

One in four people on our planet suffers from hunger and a lack of vital nutrients. This in turn makes them more vulnerable to disease and weakens their physical and mental performance.

In southern Madagascar, it is extremely dry and hot. Crops grow poorly and there is little variety of food, so an unbalanced diet weakens people in the long term and makes them ill. Over 200,000 people in southern Madagascar suffer from food insecurity and prolonged droughts. Crops and livestock have been affected by the drought.

### Water shortage and hunger are a deadly combination.

Nutrition for pregnant women and young children in the first years of life is particularly important. An unbalanced diet hinders their physical and mental development and causes irreversible damage. In addition, there is hardly any clean drinking water, which is why diarrheal diseases are very common. At the same time, people are too poor to buy adapted seeds and agricultural inputs that could improve their situation. That is why ADRA is building wells in Madagascar, so that the inhabitants can once again gain access to clean drinking water and cultivate their fields. Through training and the use of modern farming techniques, farmers are learning to sustainably increase their

harvests. Families now have sufficient quantities of food and can eat a more balanced diet. They are also able to sell surpluses at local markets, which provides them with additional income.



- 690 million people suffer from hunger.
- It is estimated that about 2.6 million children die of malnutrition each year.
- Most malnourished people live in South Asia, followed by Sub-Saharan Africa.
- In East Africa, one-third of the population is estimated to live malnourished.



- Medical care is highly problematic in terms of personnel, technology, equipment, and hygiene. In addition to infectious diseases (dengue fever, malaria, etc.) and diarrheal diseases, the Corona virus hit an exhausted population. The island is still considered a risk area, even though the health emergency and curfews were lifted in October 2020. The ADRA project was able to continue with safety precautions.



# Do not allow drowning

No one leaves their home country voluntarily. Crises, wars, violence, and the consequences of climate change force people to flee. Only a few refugees make it to Europe; most remain internally displaced persons or seek protection in neighboring countries. The Mediterranean Sea is considered the world's deadliest escape route. According to official statistics, more than 1,200 people died in 2020 trying to cross the Mediterranean to Europe. The number of actual victims is uncertain.

We support the sea rescue organization SOS MEDITERRANEE Deutschland e.V. because we do not want to passively watch children, women and men die. For us



as a Christian aid organization, which counteracts the causes of fleeing in development cooperation, saving human lives is an imperative of humanity. SOS MEDITERRANEE was founded in 2015 by Bremen-based Captain Klaus Vogel and French humanitarian expert Sophie Beau. Chartered in 2019, the Ocean Viking ship can rescue 200 people per voyage, making it currently the largest civilian sea rescue ship in the Mediterranean. A dedicated medical team provides first aid. In 2020, 903 lives were saved via the Ocean Viking.

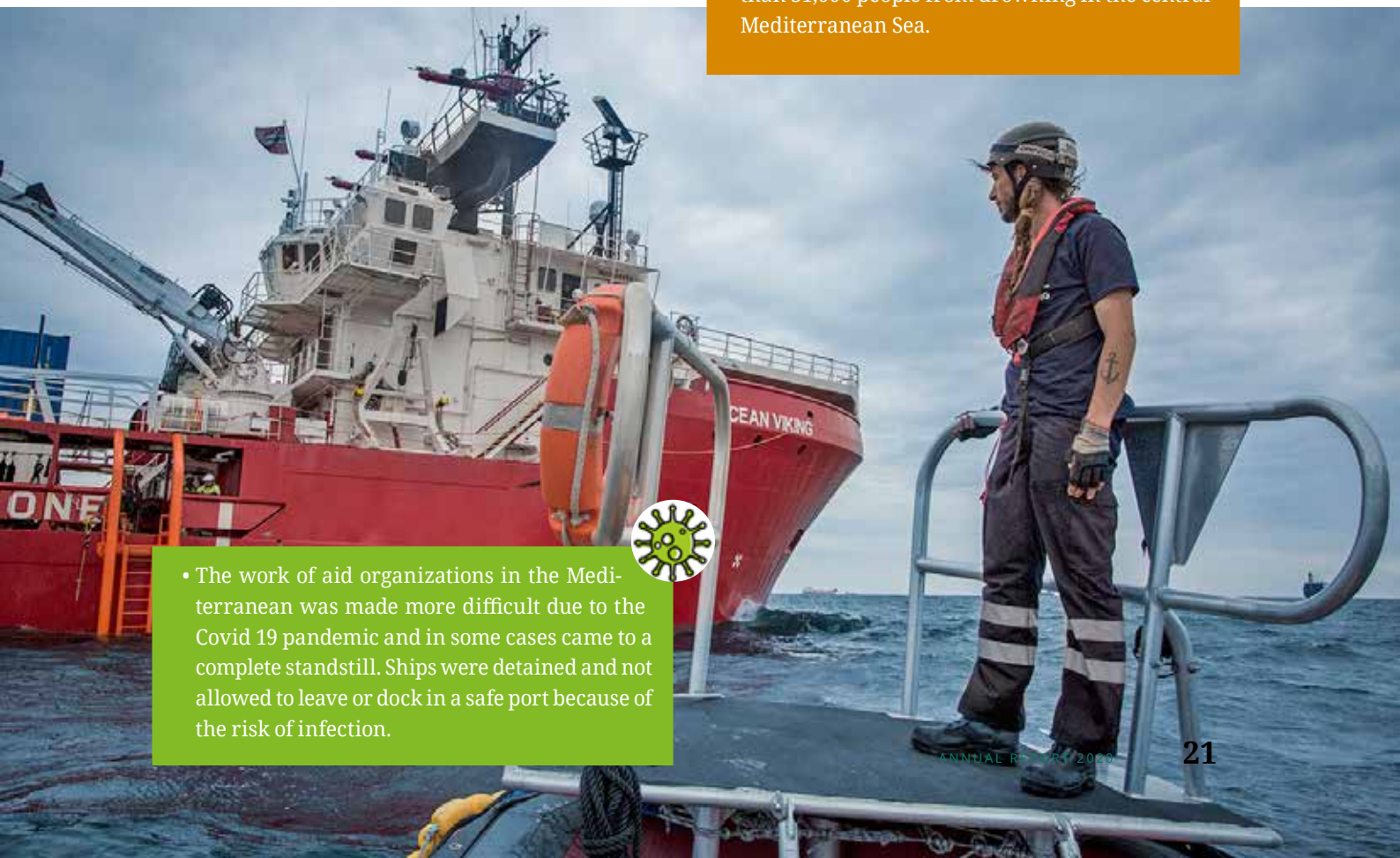

- Since 2016, SOS MEDITERRANEE has rescued more than 31,600 people from drowning in the central Mediterranean Sea.



- The work of aid organizations in the Mediterranean was made more difficult due to the Covid 19 pandemic and in some cases came to a complete standstill. Ships were detained and not allowed to leave or dock in a safe port because of the risk of infection.

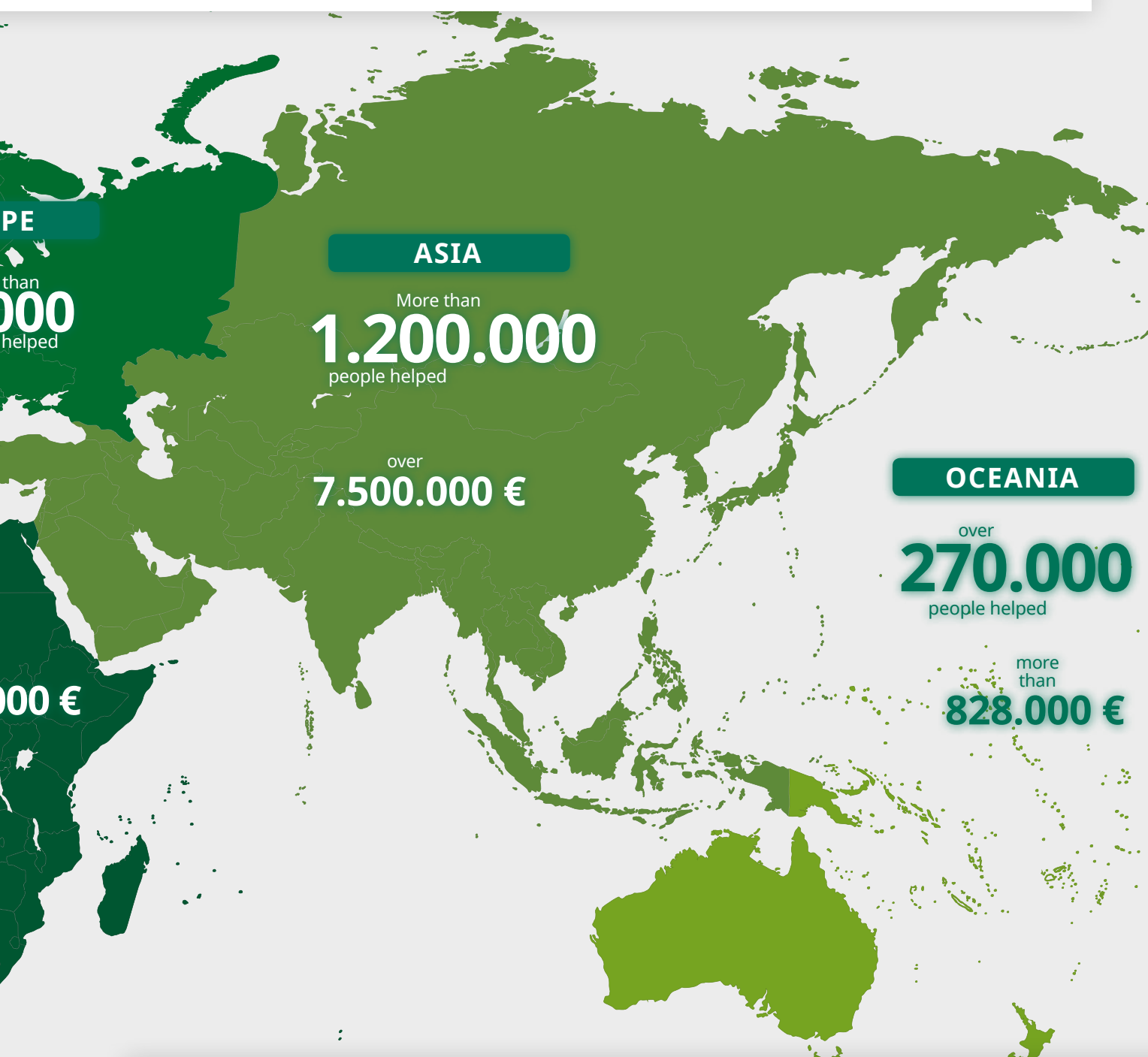

## Acting together to reduce suffering

„Being prepared for a disaster can save many lives,“

says one participant in the disaster preparedness training. In Fiji, climate change is particularly noticeable. In 12 months, the island nation of Fiji has been hit by five cyclones in categories 2 to 5. In December 2020, Cyclone Yasa caused major destruction. Rising sea levels, extreme weather events and coastal erosion threaten the livelihoods of the inhabitants. Together with them, we are taking precautionary measures to minimize the impact of future disasters. Emergency plans are being drawn up, relief supplies provided, and rescue teams formed. Shelters have been set up in churches and schools, and food supplies, drinking water and hygiene articles have been stored in storm-proof locations. To deal with extensive measures such as simulation exercises, evacuation planning and the training of rescue teams, various aid organizations and local churches joined forces to form a network. Volunteers are trained and can provide specific rapid assistance in the event of a future disaster. A total of 6,650 people directly benefited from this project.

- ADRA helped 25 households to survive with in-kind donations.
- Corona-related restrictions made it difficult to implement the project as planned.

## Finding new customers with organic products

Ms. Badam lives in Selenge Province, in northern Mongolia. Before she became unemployed, she worked as a secretary. To be able to feed her family, she started to grow herbs and vegetables.

For almost 10 years, she planted vegetables on her small plot of land, but she did not make much money. She founded a cooperative to learn new farming methods with other farmers and to make a collective transition to organic farming. „With ADRA’s help, we installed greenhouses and organic seeds and can now grow herbs, salad and vegetables according to organic standards. In 2020, we harvested 8.4 tons of vegetables, compared to seven tons in 2019. We were also able to increase our supply, from eight to 23 different varieties. We now additionally offer our certified organic products at trade fairs, which allows us to attract new customers,“ says Ms. Badam. Today, she is the chairwoman of the cooperative and in 2020 was named the best farmer in the entire district. „ADRA’s donors have helped me to be able to sell healthy food and protect nature at the same time!“ Thanks to sustainable agriculture, more people in Mongolia can secure their income and food. As a result, their living conditions are improving significantly, and they are better prepared for crises.

- In terms of area, Mongolia is four and a half times the size of Germany and, with 3.2 million inhabitants, is the most sparsely populated country in the world.
- The climate is extreme: In winter, temperatures are around -25 °C, in summer around +20 °C. This means that the fluctuations are two to three times greater than in Western Europe.
- The unemployment rate in the province of Selenge is above the national average. Farmers have only a short summer season for growing their crops. Sources of income outside this season are limited.



- The Covid 19 pandemic prevented community meetings and workshops from taking place as scheduled.
- Preparing online training delayed actions and measures.
- The project team developed a backup plan for how to conduct the project under quarantine conditions.

## From knowledge to action

On August 29 and 30, 2020, the first sustainability conference of ADRA Germany took place. Despite Corona, about 35 participants came to the Marienhöhe in Darmstadt to discuss sustainability with like-minded people. In addition to expert presentations and workshops, ADRA received prominent (virtual) visitors.

The conference opened with a keynote address by former German Minister for Economic Cooperation and Development Heidemarie Wieczorek-Zeul, in which she argued for debt relief and against the unchecked economic exploitation of the poorest countries. Ms. Wieczorek-Zeul, who also is a member of the National Council for Sustainability, argued for a binding implementation of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, like the Paris Climate Agreement. This was followed by a panel discussion, expert presentations on sustainable business and workshops discussing practical implementation. The workshops addressed both the social and environmental aspects of sustainability. Topics included: the 17 Sustainable Development Goals, the causes of displacement, fair trade, climate and migration, the psychology of climate justice, plastic-free living

in everyday life, and zero food waste. In addition to a poetry slam on the topic of sustainability by the Offenbach artist Samuel Kramer, there was also a planting action at the end, so that all participants could take a souvenir of the conference home with them. The impulses and suggestions of the conference will therefore also „bear fruit“ in the aftermath.

At the end of the conference, which was sponsored by the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development, one participant summed up the situation: „There is no problem with knowledge, we have to get ourselves and others to act! The conference provided examples of this.

# Doing good with used goods

The goal of the ADRAshops is to keep well-preserved women's, children's and men's clothing, household goods and decorative items as well as books and toys in the recycling cycle and in this way to protect the environment. The profits flow into ADRA's emergency aid and development projects. In addition, the stores are an important platform for public relations. We would like to thank all volunteers, who give our stores a face, for their commitment!

The Corona pandemic had a great impact on the development of the ADRAshops. For example, during

the two corona-related lockdowns, all the seven ADRAshops were affected by closures and were therefore unable to generate any sales. Record sales since the stores' foundation made up for this drop in sales in the fall of 2020, but unfortunately the store in Diepholz had to be closed for good. An opening of a store in Darmstadt planned for the end of the year was postponed to 2021. In total, the gross sales of the ADRAshops amounted to 274,969 € in 2020.

We have been a bearer of the DZI donation seal since 2010. ADRA Germany is also a member of the Deutscher Spendenrat e.V. (German Donations Council) and the Initiative Transparente Zivilgesellschaft (Transparent Civil Society Initiative). With our declaration of commitment to comply with standards, we show that we are aware of our responsibility to the the community.

## Huge joy over Christmas gift packages

Every year, children, parents, and grandparents throughout Germany are packing Christmas parcels for children of poor families in Eastern and Southeastern Europe. Since 2000, we have together been able to put a smile on the faces of 678,026 children.

The „Aktion Kinder helfen Kindern!“ campaign (Children helping Children) also took place in 2020. At the beginning of the Corona pandemic, it was not yet clear whether the packages could be transported abroad. After consultation with the campaign groups, the idea of distributing packages domestically proved to be very costly and difficult. Despite difficult conditions, the campaign was a great success, not least due to the hard work of the more than 400 campaign groups, and 26,942 parcels were collected. Six Eastern European countries were targeted. The children were very happy!

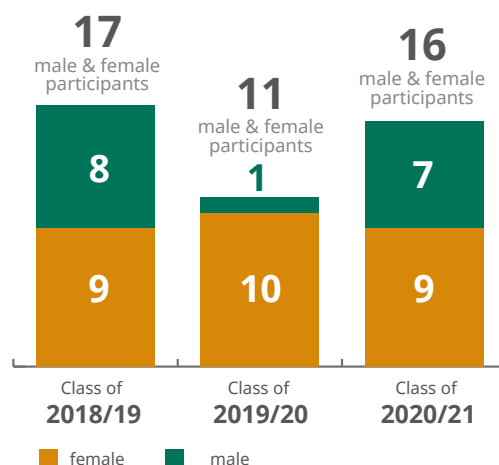




## Learning for life with ADRAlive!

ADRAlive! offers young adults the opportunity to engage in an international voluntary service for one year and to expand their horizons. This is made possible by the state-supported volunteer program „weltwärts“. In 2020, the motto was „stay flexible“. On the recommendation of the Bundesministerium für wirtschaftliche Zusammenarbeit und Entwicklung (Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development) for the return journey of all weltwärts volunteers, the ADRAlive! team organized the return journey of all volunteers. With success: Already at the beginning of April all of them were back safe and sound. The joint analog follow-up seminar in September was a highlight of the year. In 2020, no travel abroad was possible; instead, four volunteers started a weltwärts service within Germany. They engaged in various projects, gained

valuable experience, and dealt with the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). In this way, weltwärts remains a learning service in the field of development policy, regardless of whether it is exceptionally in Germany instead of abroad.











## BACK TO THE COMFORT ZONE?

The reporting year of 2020 presented us with far-reaching challenges as individuals, as society and ADRA as an organization. We were greatly moved by the matters of human rights and social justice, resilience, and sustainability.

In the spirit of transparency and accountability, as well as service and servanthood, we want to present to you in this annual report how ADRA handles funds and allows itself to be independently audited. The numerous audits show that we handle the donations and funds entrusted to us responsibly and carefully. Aware of the enormous mission involved in reducing the world's suffering, we strive in every decision to ensure that the funds and resources are used in the best way possible.

We are aware of our responsibility towards our project partners, beneficiaries and rights holders, the society itself, but also towards our employees. We moved to explicitly generate and establish stability and sustainability in ADRA's organization. Consequently, we used a strategy process to reframe and redefine ADRA Germany's medium- and long-term objectives, purpose and milestones. As an example, this process leads ADRA Germany to further integrate climate change mitigation and -adaptation in our programs.

Our annual result this year helps to continue ADRA's financial stabilization by steadily reducing the accumulated deficit carried forward. Resilience of organizations in respect to external influences is on many people's lips now, but for ADRA it is a necessity to constantly build this strength: not only to secure the trust of our institutional donors, but especially to be able to serve the recipients of our aid in the long term.

With what we have achieved this year, we have been able to build reassurance, trust and further stability. Is that a reason to feel a certain „comfort“? At most partially. Because in a volatile setting in terms of the world's growing crises, the stressed environment, the upcoming elections in Germany and an increasing threat to social justice, the coming years will bring conditions which will pose the framework for an enormous challenge.

We consciously accept the mentioned challenges, knowing that we will never reach a „comfort zone.“ But the more we operate outside our comfort zone, the more we experience an overwhelming mutual commitment to help, and at the same time, a united promise to build a better world that transforms and continuously improves existence and environment. As ADRA team, we carry on counting on your help!

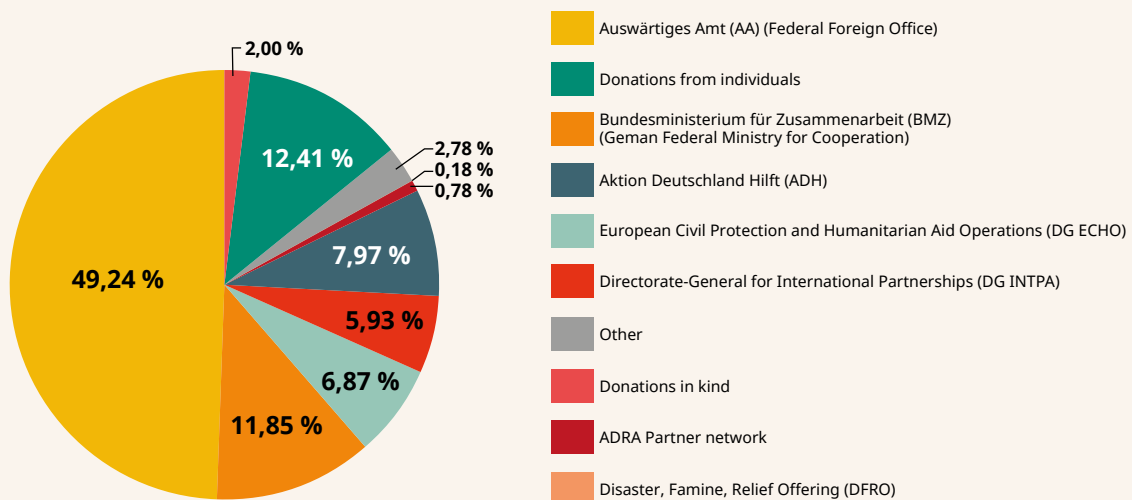

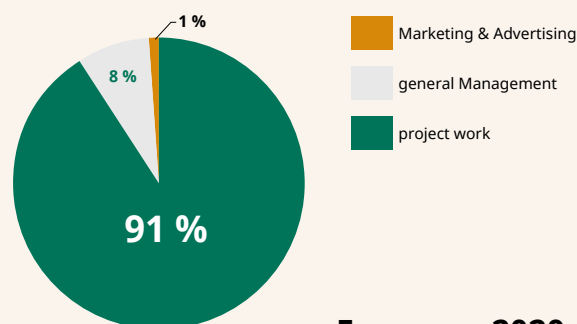
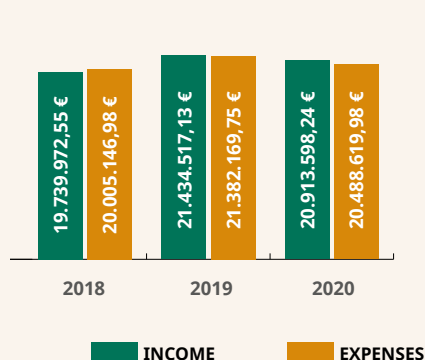
